



Yeshua (Jesus) often withdrew to a quiet place to pray as an example to us. It is a powerful way to retreat even you can't get away for a few days. He likely wore a prayer shawl over his head with his prayer shawl when He prayed and taught. Certain items matter, not because they have power, but because they help us connect more deeply with Him. It is the quiet place to regain perspective in life's tumultuous waters. Get in His boat in the right setting so you can confidently ride His wave without faltering and jump into deeper study of His chosen truths for you.

It's the wave which will return those who get in the boat back to the Captain's harbor. You can schedule His chosen days and times into your monthly and yearly pages. This year's Biblical event dates are in the last section. If you prefer to be able to move events around on the monthly layouts, you can use 1 7/8 inch square sticky notes (we recommend the super sticky kind), since we designed the calendar boxes. You have permission to reproduce the daily and weekly layout to use for your purposes only.

Pray about the process, ask the Master and Commander to direct you, and update your planner often yet be open to how He might reroute things for divine appointments. Write down inspirations, important dates, Bible quotes, and other information right away on extra pages or sticky notes so they aren't forgotten. Soon you will learn which techniques work for you, but He might stir up your agenda!

We have more resources in development to enrich the study of His Word, enhance the worship of His Person, and encourage creatives for His purposes, so we hope you'll enter in and sense the Wonder of the Word. 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Shema יִשְׁמֵע - Hear

Insight and Focus

The Shema is the commanded, central, and foundational declaration of the Jewish faith - the declaration of His Chosen People. The Hebrew and phonetic Hebrew versions below are the short, traditional adaptation taken from Deuteronomy 6:4-12 which is recited every morning and night by most observant Jewish believers worldwide. The Shema can be recited sitting or standing, morning and night, during significant celebrations and Biblical Days including the weekly Shabbat service, anytime one feels the need to be reminded of the instruction, and before death. Many choose to place the right hand over the eyes in reverence during its recitation while standing, and some bend the knees and bow when the word *baruch* is mentioned. What matters most is a reverent heart of respect toward Him. Hear also implies do.

Hear O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is One, Blessed be the glory of His majesty forever and ever.

Sheh-mah yisrael, adonai eloheinu, adonai echad Baruch shem kavod malchuto l'olam va-ed

"The next line of the *Shema* originated in the ancient Temple service. When the priests recited the first verse of the *Shema* during the service each morning, the people gathered in the Temple would respond "Blessed is the name of His Glorious Majesty forever and ever" (*Barukh shem kvod malkhuto l'olam va-ed*). This line became incorporated as the second line of the daily *Shema*. To indicate that it is not part of the Biblical passage of the *Shema*, it is said quietly, except for on Yom Kippur when it is recited out loud." Perception and Perspective

The Shema is a beautiful declaration given to the people of Israel as a way to keep G-d central in our hearts, minds, and lives, and a way to pass it on as part of our a faith legacy. We've included three English translations of the extended Shema here, meaning verses 4-12 and felt led to use a hyphen to avoid misusing His Name in too common of a way. It is just a reminder that His Name is holy.

The head of the household will usually recite or lead the family to recite the Shema during Shabbat and with the children every night before they go to sleep. Some also place a piece of artwork or tapestry showing it on their wall to remind the family of its centrality and importance. You can hear it at the end of our Legacy Vision Episode 2 podcast on www.SensoryBibleExperiences.com. Perhaps listen to a new version from different countries once a month. The important thing is to say it with heartfelt joy.

Deuteronomy 6:4 "Hear O Israel, the L-rd our G-d, the L-rd is one. 5 Love *Adonai* your G-d with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. 6 These words, which I am commanding you today, are to be on your heart. 7 You are to teach them diligently to your children, and speak of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down and when you rise up. 8 Bind them as a sign on your hand, they are to be as frontlets between your eyes, 9 and write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates. 10 "Now when *Adonai* your G-d brings you into the land that He swore to your fathers—to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob—to give you great and good cities that you did not build, 11 and houses full of all good things that you did not fill, and cisterns dug that you did not dig, vineyards and olive trees that you did not plant, and you eat and are full, 12 then watch yourself so that you do not forget *Adonai*, who brought you out from the land of Egypt, from the house of slavery. (TLV)

Deuteronomy 6:4 "Sh'ma, Yisra'el! Adonai Eloheinu, Adonai echad [Hear, Isra'el! Adonai our G-d, Adonai is one]; 5 and you are to love Adonai your G-d with all your heart, all your being and all your resources. 6 These words, which I am ordering you today, are to be on your heart; 7 and you are to teach them carefully to your children. You are to talk about them when you sit at home, when you are traveling on the road, when you lie down and when you get up. 8 Tie them on your hand as a sign, put them at the front of a headband around your forehead, 9 and write them on the door-frames of your house and on your gates. 10 "When Adonai your G-d has brought you into the land he swore to your ancestors Avraham, Yitz'chak and Ya'akov that he would give you — cities great and prosperous, which you didn't build; 11 houses full of all sorts of good things, which you didn't fill; water cisterns dug out, which you didn't dig; vineyards and olive trees, which you didn't plant — and you have eaten your fill; 12 then be careful not to forget Adonai, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, where you lived as slaves. (CJB)

Deuteronomy 6:4 "Hear, O Israel: The L-rd our G-d, the L-rd *is* one! 5 You shall love the Lord your G-d with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength. 6 "And these words which I command you today shall be in your heart. 7 You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down, and when you rise up. 8 You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. 9 You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates. 10 "So it shall be, when the L-rd your G-d brings you into the land of which He swore to your fathers, to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, to give you large and beautiful cities which you did not build, 11 houses full of all good things, which you did not fill, hewn-out wells which you did not dig, vineyards and olive trees which you did not plant—when you have eaten and are

full— 12 *then* beware, lest you forget the Lord who brought you out of the land of Egypt, from the house of bondage. (NKJV)

The Aaronic or Priestly Blessing

Focus and Insight

The Aaronic Blessing is the most important blessing in the observant Jew, one that Aaron and his sons were commanded to use to bless the people of Israel, recorded in Numbers 6:23–27:

"The L-rd said to Moses, 'Tell Aaron and his sons, "This is how you are to bless the Israelites. Say to them:

""The L-rd bless you and keep you; The L-rd make his face shine on you and be gracious to you; The L-rd turn his face toward you and give you peace.""

"So they will put my name on the Israelites, and I will bless them."

Because of the simple elegance and profound sentiments expressed in this blessing, it has been used throughout the centuries long after the sacrifices of the Aaronic priesthood ended. It is commonly used today in Judaism, Messianic Judaism, the Hebrew Roots Movement and known as the Priestly Blessing, the Priestly Benediction (*birkat kohanim*), the *Dukhanen*, or the "raising of the hands," although the specific time and method of pronouncement differs within the various groups of Judaism.

Perception and Perspective

A closer analysis of the blessing shows that the emphasis is upon God. God originates the blessing—it was G-d who instructed Aaron on the proper form of the blessing and gave instructions for it to be spoken over the people to begin with. The blessing itself emphasizes that it is the L-rd who blesses the people and does for them what they cannot do for themselves. *The L-rd bless you and keep you*. A blessing from the L-rd is requested; it's not just a general blessing but the specific protection of the L-rd as we ask Him to "keep you," words that have the sense of guarding or watching over someone. For Israel, this would have had a very practical application as they were surrounded by enemies, and G-d had promised to protect them as long as they were faithful to Him. For the New Covenant believer, the protection of G-d has a somewhat different connotation... In fact, He has promised persecution (2 Timothy 3:12). However, G-d has also promised that nothing shall be able to separate us from the love of G-d that is in Yeshua (Romans 8:36–38).

The L-rd make his face shine on you and be gracious to you. This line of the blessing has to do with experiencing G-d's favor. When a person sees a loved one, his or her face "lights up." G-d's "face" radiates divine favor. Ancient Israel could expect G-d's

loving, gracious response to their calls for help. New Covenant believers have the promise of G-d's never-ending love (Romans 8:26–38, mentioned above) and have already experienced God's gracious response to save us from our greatest enemies—sin and death (1 Corinthians 15:56–57).

The L-rd turn his face toward you and give you peace. This line of the Aaronic Blessing continues the theme of the "face" of G-d and has the idea of His people receiving His full attention...When the people were faithful to G-d, His "face" was toward them with the result that they would have peace. Peace (*shalom*) is more than just an absence of warfare but a completeness or wholeness and maturity. Judges 2 records what happened when G-d turned His face from His people for a time and they lost *shalom*, but He quickly turned to them again when they repented.

The New Covenant believer has been granted peace with G-d though Yeshua (Romans 5:1), and we can also access the peace of G-d by trusting Him to take care of us. Prayer is the active means by which we can experience this peace (Philippians 4:6–7).

For ancient Israel, the Aaronic Blessing expressed the highest state of blessing that the nation would enjoy as they were faithful to God. The application is slightly different for the New Covenant believer. Yeshua has already granted us all of the things that are asked for in the Aaronic Blessing, and they have been granted on a permanent basis. Our direct experience of these things can fluctuate over time. For the believer, this blessing should be a reminder of what one has in Yeshua. It should also be a prayer for a fuller understanding of G-d's blessings in Yeshua and for the corresponding feelings that should accompany that understanding.(Source: www.gotquestions.org).

The Priestly Blessing... also called the threefold blessing, is an ancient benediction recited by the priests (*kohanim*) in the holy temple in Jerusalem. Today, it is recited in synagogues most commonly during the Musaf prayer, the additional holiday service recited after the Torah reading. The blessing today is traditionally recited in synagogues by the kohanim, the descendants of Moses' brother Aaron who served as priests in the temple. The common procedure is for the Levites, the descendants of the tribe of Levi who served as assistants in the temple, to wash the hands of the kohanim, who then remove their shoes and stand before the ark.

[May] <u>Adonai</u> bless you, and guard you – יְבָרֶכְךְּ יהוה, וְיִּשְׁמְרֶךְ Yivarechecha Adonai viyishmirecha

[May] Adonai make His face shine unto you, and be gracious to you – ָיָאֵר יהוה פָּנָיו אֵלֶיךְ, וִיחֻנֶּךְ Yāʾēr Adhōnāy pānāw ēlekhā viḥunnékkā

[May] Adonai lift up His face unto you, and give to you peace -

יַשָּׂא יהוה פָּנָיו אֵלֶיךְ, וְיָשֵׂם לְךְ שָׁלוֹם Yissā Adhōnāy pānāw ēlekhā viyāshēm lekhā shālōm.

Insight and Focus

The *Amidah* is the core of every core Jewish worship service, and is therefore also referred to as *HaTefillah*, or "*The* prayer." Amidah, which literally means, "standing," refers to a series of blessings recited while standing. It can also enrich our personal worship time. It is interesting to note that the Our Father or L-rd's Prayer is a condensed version of this one - a summary if you will, but it is more probable the Yeshua was quoting the Amidah. You can face Israel, or Jerusalem if you are in Israel, and cover your head with a kappa or prayer shawl if the Spirit leads.

Using the image of master and servant, the Rabbis felt that a worshipper should come before his or her Master first with words of praise, then should ask one's petitions, and finally should withdraw (joyfully and reverently) with words of thanks. Thus, every Amidah is divided into three central sections: praise, petitions and thanks.

Perception and Perspective

Originally, Jewish prayer was largely unstructured. Although the Rabbis eventually codified the format and themes of each of the blessings, it was initially left to the creativity of individual prayer leaders to generate the specific wording of the blessings. Individual communities in different countries began to settle on somewhat standard versions of the prayers over time. Today the variations between the traditional texts of the Amidah in different communities are fairly minor. This helps worshipers feel more at ease when they visit various synagogues, it is familiar enough to follow along. While differences exist in the various Jewish sects, this is a prayer which brings beautiful unity and this is what Yeshua wanted for us:

John 17:21-23 (NKJV) ²¹ that they all may be one, as You, Father, are in Me, and I in You; that they also may be one in Us, that the world may believe that You sent Me. ²² And the glory which You gave Me I have given them, that they may be one just as We are one: ²³ I in them, and You in Me; that they may be made perfect in one, and that the world may know that You have sent Me, and have loved them as You have loved Me.

Luke 11:1-4 (TLV) Now Yeshua was praying in a certain place. When He finished, one of His disciples said to Him, "Master, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples."

² Then Yeshua said to them, "When you pray, say, 'Father, sanctified be Your Name, Your kingdom come.^{[a] 3} Give us each day our daily bread. ⁴ And forgive us our sins, for we also forgive everyone indebted to us. And lead us not into temptation."

The Amidah is recited silently by all members of a congregation — or by individuals praying along — and then, in communal settings, repeated aloud by the prayer leader or cantor, with the congregation reciting "Amen" to all the blessings of the Amidah. (Source: MyJewishLearning.com, some emphasis mine.)

A Messianic Jewish Amidah adapted by Blaine Robinson, used by permission.

Note: This Messianic Jewish Amidah (aka *Shemoneh Esrei*) is based on the original Jewish Amidah and designed for use by talmidim of Messiah Yeshua. This version of the Amidah incorporates the hyphenated names L-rd and G-d in deference to Jewish sensibilities. The Amidah used in Yeshua's day did not have a prescribed text for each of the 18 sections. The content of the prayer was codified after the destruction of the temple in A.D. 70. Feel free to add you own words in each of the sections of this prayer.

- 1. *Avot* ("Ancestors"): "Blessed are You, ADONAI, Creator of the universe, G-d Most High, and G-d of the patriarchs, G-d of Abraham, G-d of Isaac, and G-d of Jacob. The great El Shaddai, mighty and awesome G-d, G-d Supreme who extends loving kindness and is Master of all, who remembers the gracious deeds of our spiritual forefathers, and who has brought a Redeemer with love for His name's sake. King, Helper, Savior and Protector, blessed are You, ADONAI, Protector of Abraham."
- 2. Gevurot ("Powers"): "Your might is eternal, L-rd G-d, who revives the dead, powerful in saving, who makes the wind to blow and the rain to fall, who sustains the living with loving kindness, who revives the dead with great mercy, who supports the falling, heals the sick, frees the captive, and keeps faith with the dead; who is like You, Almighty, and who resembles You, O King who can bring death and give life."
- 3. *Kedushat HaShem* ("Sanctification of the Name"): "We cry with the angels: Holy, Holy, Holy, is the L-rd G-d Almighty. Your name is holy, and those who are holy shall praise You every day. Blessed are You, ADONAI, the holy G-d." [*Selah* meditate on this.]
- 4. *Binah* ("Understanding"): "You grant knowledge to man, and teach understanding to humans; from Your own self, favor us with knowledge, understanding, and sense. Blessed are You, ADONAI, giver of knowledge."
- 5. *Teshuvah* ("Repentance"): "Return us, our Abba Father, to Your Scriptures, and draw us closer, our King, to Your worship, and bring us back before You in complete repentance. Blessed are You, ADONAI, who desires repentance." [Remember any unsaved friends, family members or others.]
- 6. Selichah ("Forgiveness"): "Forgive us, our Father, for we have sinned, pardon us, our King, for we have transgressed, for You are a pardoner and forgiver. Blessed are You, ADONAI, gracious One who forgives abundantly." [Name your own sins, failures,

doubtful practices, hurtful actions toward another and unloving attitudes that need forgiveness.]

- 7. Geulah ("Redemption"): "Look upon us in our suffering, and fight our struggles, redeem us speedily, for Your name's sake, for You are a mighty Redeemer. Blessed are You, Messiah Yeshua, ADONAI, Redeemer of Israel."
- 8. *Refuah* ("Healing"): "Heal us, O ADONAI, and we shall be healed, save us, O Yeshua, and we shall be saved, for You are our glory. Send complete healing for our every illness, for You, Divine King, are the faithful, merciful Physician. Blessed are You, ADONAI, who heals the sick of Your people." [Remember any in the congregation, your family or acquaintances that need healing.]
- 9. *Birkat HaShanim* ("Blessing for Years [of good]"): "Bless this year for us, O ADONAl our G-d, and all its varied produce that it be for good; provide dew and rain as a blessing on the face of the earth, satisfy us with Your goodness, and bless this year like the good years. Blessed are You, ADONAI, who blessed the years."
- 10. Galuyot ("Diasporas"): "Sound the great shofar to proclaim freedom for all the Land of Israel, lift up a banner for the ingathering of Your exiled people, and bring them together from the four corners of the earth. Blessed are You, ADONAI, who gathers together the dispersed of Your people Israel to fulfill the word of the prophets." [Pray also that Jews spiritually exiled from G-d will return and accept Yeshua as their Messiah and Savior.]
- 11. *Birkat HaDin* ("Justice"): "Restore justice in the land and remove from us sorrow and sighing. Defend the fatherless, protect the widow. Save the innocent from destruction. Rebuke the oppressor. Break down the strongholds of evil in our culture. Rule over us

Messiah Yeshua, O ADONAI, with kindness and mercy, and vindicate us in the judgment. Blessed are You, ADONAI, King, who loves righteousness and judgment."

- 12. *Tzadikim* ("Righteous"): "On the righteous and the saintly, on the elders of Your people, on the Commonwealth of Israel, on the teachers of Your Word, on all true *talmidim* of Messiah Yeshua, let Your compassion flow, O ADONAI our G-d. Grant a good reward to all who sincerely trust in Your name; place our lot with them forever and let us not be shamed, for in You do we trust. Blessed are You, ADONAI, the support and security of the righteous."
- 13. Bo'ne Yerushalayim ("Builder of Jerusalem"): "To Jerusalem Your city, return with compassion, and dwell within it as You promised; cleanse it of idolatry and wickedness, build it in our day as an everlasting structure; and speedily establish the reign of Messiah Yeshua in its midst on the throne of David. Blessed are You, ADONAI, builder of Jerusalem."
- 14. *Birkat David* ("Blessing of David"): "The offspring of Your servant David, Messiah Yeshua, quickly come to bring deliverance; for Your deliverance do we constantly hope. Blessed are You, ADONAI, who makes the glory of deliverance to flourish."

- 15. *Tefillah* ("Prayer"): "Hear our voice, O ADONAl our G-d, show compassion and mercy to us, accept our prayers with mercy and favor, for You are a G-d who hears prayers and supplications." [You may add a personal prayer.]
- 16. *Avodah* ("Service"): "Favorably receive, O ADONAI our G-d, Your people and their prayer, restore true worship in Zion, receive with love and favor our offerings, our prayers, and may the worship of Your people always be favorably received by You, may our eyes behold Your return to Zion in mercy. Blessed are You, ADONAI, who restores His Divine Presence to Zion."
- 17. Hodaah ("Thanksgiving"): "We give thanks to You who are ADONAI our G-d and G-d of our fathers for all eternity. You are the strength of our lives, the shield of our deliverance. In every generation, we shall thank You and declare Your praise for our lives that are entrusted in Your hand, and for our souls that are in Your care, and for Your miracles that are daily with us, and for Your wondrous deeds and goodness that occur at all times, evening, morning, and noon. You are the Benevolent One, for Your mercies are never ended. The Compassionate One, for Your deeds of kindness do not stop, always have we placed our hope in You. For all this, O Yeshua, our King, may Your name be always blessed and exalted forever and ever. All the living will forever thank You and praise Your name in truth, O G-d, O Messiah Yeshua, our eternal salvation and help. Blessed are You, ADONAI, whose name is goodness; it is pleasing to give thanks to You." [Selah meditate on this,]
- 18. Shalom ("Peace"): "Establish peace, well-being, blessing, grace, loving kindness, and mercy upon us and upon all of the Commonwealth of Israel, for by the light of Your presence have you given us, O ADONAI our G-d, instruction of life in Your Word, love of kindness, justice, blessing, compassion, life, and peace, and it is good in Your sight to bless Your people at all times and in every hour with Your peace. Blessed are You, ADONAI, who blessed His people, the Commonwealth of Israel, with shalom."

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שַבָּת Shabbat - Rest

Insight and Focus

Shabbat (Sabbath or Shabbos) is a time chosen by the G-d of Israel during which Jews celebrate freedom from the regular labors of everyday life. It offers a lovely opportunity to get off the daily treadmill, savor what is good, contemplate the spiritual aspects of life, and spend time with family. Sabbath is given special status as a holy day at the very beginning of the Torah in Genesis 2:1–3. It is first commanded after the Exodus from Egypt, in Exodus 16:26 (relating to the cessation of manna) and as also in Exodus 20:8–11 (as the fourth of the Ten Commandments). It was G-d's idea for us to rest on the seventh day, and He showed us by His own example. It is fun to remember that Shabbat starts with "shhh...", or a time to be still after the whirlwind of the week. The more you focus on preparing for Shabbat, the more it will give back to you.

Shabbat is observed and enjoyed from a few minutes before sunset on Friday evening until the appearance of three stars in the sky on Saturday night. Shabbat is welcomed in by lighting candles and reciting a blessing. The evening meal and the early afternoon meal typically begin with a blessing named *kiddush* and another blessing recited over two loaves of challah. Challah is a very special braided bread, a labor of family devotion and love often, but not only, baked by the matriarch or women of the household. It is a lovely custom to pray over the family and Shabbat during the mixing and baking process. Shabbat comes to a bittersweet close the following evening with a *havdalah* blessing over a braided candle, cup of juice or wine, and spices. Some attend service on Friday night, on Shabbat, or both to learn, worship, and pray. (Source: Wikipedia)

Perception and Perspective

We've included the basic information to help you get started, including the blessings mentioned above in the Shabbat blessing section. What is beautiful is that each individual or family can personalize Shabbat by incorporating special blessings, recipes and traditions they want to pass on to their future generations. Most importantly, once the decision is made to celebrate it, it should be viewed as a delight and not a frustration. Some families choose to wear white and use their best dishes and tablecloth for the occasion. The Shabbat is His sign to us, much like a wedding ring, that we are His beloved bride and we choose to accept His lifestyle for us by drinking the cup. Below is a list and tips to help you begin and continue the Shabbat journey with joy. You might even like to add inspirational drawings around the margin of this section to make it your own.

Isaiah 58:13-14 The Message (emphasis ours)

"If you watch your step on the Sabbath and don't use My holy day for personal advantage, If you treat the Sabbath as a day of joy, God's holy day as a celebration,

If you honor it by refusing 'business as usual,' making money, running here and there— Then you'll be free to enjoy G-d! Oh, I'll make you ride high and soar above it all. I'll make you feast on the inheritance of your ancestor Jacob." Yes! G-d says so!

Shabbat Preparation List and Tips

If you start early and do a few of the items every day on Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday to pace yourself, as well as delegate when possible, you will find a schedule and routine which work for you. Putting all the non-perishable items you need in a special Shabbat box or basket saves time.

Preparation ahead of time ensures that the Shabbat remains a delight and does not begin to feel like a burden. Our families will benefit greatly if we position our hearts correctly to support the leader of the home, avoid strife and stress, but really embrace one of joy and life. This requires great prayer, patience, and practice.

Our most important tip is to find at least an hour to prepare your own body, heart and mind for Shabbat. It is well worth the effort and helps our own heart be in the right condition to minister to others, to rest and spend time in private worship, study, and prayer at the best point for you prior to Erev Shabbat (Friday evening).

Mark a T, W, or TH for the best day of the week to get that item done, and utilize the tools in the Sort section of the Planner to establish a routine.

- Focus on the reason for Shabbat: to *delight in the obedience which brings the blessing*. Eliminate or minimize negativity, and emphasize the positive aspects of and beauty in the preparation for the Shabbat.
- _ Clean out and fuel up the car.
- De-clutter, organize, and clean the living space. Do your biggest weekly family jobs early in the week.
- Gather ingredients for or pre-make your meals (freeze ahead if needed) including snacks for before or after service. Many find programmable slow-cookers or pressure-cookers helpful as they can be programmed to keep the food warm after cooking. Instant oatmeal, bread, and healthy toppings for them, etc. make for easy breakfast most family members can prepare themselves.
- _ Fill water bottles, finish laundry, take out the trash, etc.
- _ Purchase or bake challah, ensure you have grape juice or wine.

- Pre-set the table with your nice dishes, utensils, and glasses, head covering/s, two candles (battery-operated ones are safer around children and can be left on), Bible, Kiddush cup for the wine/grape juice, bread board or plate and cover, booklets or pages of the blessings, and prayers, fresh flowers or another centerpiece, etc. A tzekaka or charity box for coins is nice, also. You might also like to provide a small flask of oil with which to anoint each family member.
- Set aside special best or white clothes to wear and totes or backpacks with healthy snacks to take to services. Encourage everyone to mikveh or bathe to prepare spiritually.
- Set timers on your electronics to shut off or be silenced if desired. Enjoy battery-operated candles all over the house for a lovely glow on this special night.
- Let family and friends know you will not respond during this time unless it is an emergency.
- Prepare a quiet activity box for young children which they only see on Shabbat. Ensure relaxing activities like encouraging audio and regular books, art, and uplifting music are accessible.
- Help older children to plan their own positive, life-giving Bible-centered activities and games after service.
- Keep it simple and streamlined, you'll develop a routine eventually. Prayerfully seek guidance from your spouse on how and when to to participate in activities such as charity causes, classes, groups, and studies. Avoid usual work-week conversations about money, problems, troubling world news, transactions, and other stressors. Try to create a safe sanctuary environment.
- The essential commandment on this day is to rest. Allow plenty of margin to let you breathe, relax and reset. Request to take a long bath or nap without interruptions.
- Compile a folder or binder of favorite make-ahead recipes for Shabbat and other holidays.

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The Shabbat Blessings

Below are the sacred and sweet blessings recited while standing, if one is able, during the eve of Shabbat (erev Shabbat) before sunset, including those said over the candles, bread and the juice (wine), wife, husband, children, and more. Before Shabbat begins, some like to say the blessing for and wash hands then say the Shema, but you can pray and ask Him to give you direction for your family. You can learn them in English then in Hebrew using the phonetic pronunciations.

Washing the Hands

We each set the intention that He may prepare our hearts to enter into and delight in His Shabbat. You can use a special cup for this purpose if you like. Some like to the cup a little with each blessing mentioned until it runs over.

Psalm 23:5
You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies.
You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. (NIV)

Blessed are You, L-rd our G-d, King of the universe, who has sanctified us with Your commandments, and commanded us concerning the washing of the hands.

Baruch ata Adonai, Eloheinu Melech ha-olam, asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav vitzivanu al n'tilat yadayim.

Recitation the Shema

We begin with the Shema, the most important declaration of faith for observant Jewish people. Once all are gathered at the table, the patriarch of the family leads:

Hear O Israel, the L-rd our G-d, the L-rd is One.

Blessed be Name of His glorious majesty for ever and ever. Amen.

Shema Israel, Adonai Eloheinu, Adonai Echad.

Baruch Shem Kvod Malchuto Leolam Vaed.

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Blessing over the Candles (neirot)

This is normally done by the mother or matriarch of the family or if there is none, the father or single person. Some cover their heads, some circle the candles with their hands, others choose not to.

Blessed are You, L-rd our G-d, King of the universe, who sanctified us with His commandments, and commanded us to kindle the light of the holy Shabbat.

Baruch A-tah Ado-nai E-lo-hei-nu Me-lech Ha-olam A-sher Ki-de-sha-nu Be-mitz-vo-tav Ve-tzi-va-nu Le-had-lik Ner Shel Sha-bbat Ko-desh.

Blessing over the Wine (yaeen) or Juice (pree ha-gafehn)

Recited by the father or patriarch while holding a cup full of grape juice or wine is called the Kiddush. Some like to the cup a little with each thing or person people are thankful for until it runs over before the blessing.

Blessed are You O L-rd our G-d, King of the Universe, Creator of the fruit of the vine.

Baruch A-tah Ado-nai E-lo-hei-nu Me-lech Ha-olam borey pree ha-gafen.

The father or patriarch then drinks some juice or wine then the cup is passed around or each person drinks from their own cup.

Blessing over the Bread (lechem)

Traditionally two loaves are made representing the double portion of manna, and they are covered until it is time to bless it.

Blessed are You O L-rd our G-d King of the Universe who brings forth the bread from the earth.

Baruch A-tah Ado-nai E-lo-hei-nu Me-lech Ha-olam hamotsee lehem meen ha'aretz.

He then breaks one loaf, takes a piece and passes the plate so all can take a piece and partake together.

Blessed are You O L-rd our G-d King of the Universe who creates the various kinds of foods.

Baruch A-tah Ado-nai E-lo-hei-nu Me-lech Ha-olam

Boray Mee nay Matzonot.

Wife/Mother (ishtee/ima)

It is customary to give the mother/wife much appreciation, honor, flowers or a card, to read **Proverbs 31:10-31** over her, and add a personal blessing and prayer for her. The husband might place one arm around his wife and his prayer shawl around her as her protector.

- 10 Who can find a virtuous wife? For her worth is far above rubies.
- ¹¹ The heart of her husband safely trusts her; So he will have no lack of gain.
- ¹² She does him good and not evil All the days of her life.
- ¹³ She seeks wool and flax, And willingly works with her hands.
- ¹⁴ She is like the merchant ships, She brings her food from afar.
- ¹⁵ She also rises while it is yet night, And provides food for her household, And a portion for her maidservants.
- ¹⁶ She considers a field and buys it; From her profits she plants a vineyard.
- ¹⁷ She girds herself with strength, And strengthens her arms. ¹⁸ She perceives that her merchandise *is* good, And her lamp does not go out by night.
- ¹⁹ She stretches out her hands to the distaff, And her hand holds the spindle.
- ²⁰ She extends her hand to the poor, Yes, she reaches out her hands to the needy.
- ²¹ She is not afraid of snow for her household, For all her household *is* clothed with scarlet.
- ²² She makes tapestry for herself; Her clothing *is* fine linen and purple.
- ²³ Her husband is known in the gates, When he sits among the elders of the land.
- ²⁴ She makes linen garments and sells *them*, And supplies sashes for the merchants.
- ²⁵ Strength and honor *are* her clothing; She shall rejoice in time to come.
- ²⁶ She opens her mouth with wisdom, And on her tongue *is* the law of kindness.
- ²⁷ She watches over the ways of her household, And does not eat the bread of idleness.
- ²⁸ Her children rise up and call her blessed; Her husband *also*, and he praises her:
- ²⁹ "Many daughters have done well, But you excel them all."
- ³⁰ Charm *is* deceitful and beauty *is* passing, But a woman *who* fears the Lord, she shall be praised.
- ³¹ Give her of the fruit of her hands, And let her own works praise her in the gates. (NKJV)

Husband/Father (b'alee/abba)

It is customary to read **Psalm 1** over the husband or father, and add a personalized blessing or prayer.

- 1Blessed *is* the man who walks not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor stands in the path of sinners, nor sits in the seat of the scornful;
- ² But his delight *is* in the law of the Lord, and in His law he meditates day and night.
- ³ He shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that brings forth its fruit in its season, Whose leaf also shall not wither; and whatever he does shall prosper.
- ⁴ The ungodly *are* not so, but *are* like the chaff which the wind drives away.
- ⁵ Therefore the ungodly shall not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous.
- ⁶ For the Lord knows the way of the righteous, But the way of the ungodly shall perish. (NKJV)

Children (yeladim)

This custom is taken from the Aaronic Blessing and is a sweet way to make each child feel uniquely valued. The parents can hold the prayer shawl over the children for this time.

For boys, the first line is:

May you be like Ephraim and Menashe.

Yesimcha Elohim k'Ephraim v'chi-Menashe.

For girls, the first line is:

May you be like Sarah, Rebecca, Rachel, and Leah.

Yesimech Elohim k'Sarah Rivka Rachel v'Leah

For both the rest of the blessing is:

May G-d bless you and protect you.

Yivarechecha Adonai v'yishmerecha

May G-d show you favor and be gracious to you.

Ya'er Adonai panav eilecha vichuneka

May G-d show you kindness and grant you peace.

Yisa Adonai panav eilecha v'yasem lecha shalom

There are also melodies to sing the blessing such as that from Fiddler on the Roof which can be found on YouTube like Joshua Aaron's Ha Bracha.

Guests and Specific Needs

Your family might like to say blessings and prayers for guests and any specific needs at this time.

Hebrews 12:2 (NKJV) Do not forget to entertain strangers, for by so doing some have unwittingly entertained angels.

Now we can enjoy a relaxed dinner and positive conversation, to visit those in need of company, study, pray, play, worship and engage in other practices to help you enter into His peace until three stars are visible or the sun has set on Saturday evening. You can bring Shabbat to a close with Havdala.

הבְדָּלָה - Havdala - Separation

The Havdalah ceremony is a beautiful way to bring Shabbat to a close and begin the next week when three stars are visible in the sky (or it is past dusk). The family usually gathers for dinner, to say/hear the blessings, and enjoy the sight of a lit braided candle (or battery-operated one for safety), taste the sweetness of the grape juice or wine, feel the cup, and smell the pungent, fragrant spices - another truly romantic sensory Bible experience! You may choose to play a fun family board game or spend some time blessing and praying for local and global needs as well as each other's coming week.

Opening Scripture/Song

Behold, G-d is my unfailing help; I will trust in G-d and will not be afraid. God is strength and song, my Deliverer. With joy shall you draw water out of the wells of salvation. G-d alone is our help; may G-d bless His people. G-d of the universe is with us; the G-d of Jacob is our protection. There was light and joy; gladness and honor for the Jewish people. So may we be blessed. I will lift the cup of salvation and call upon G-d's Name.

Juice/Wine

Blessed are You O L-rd our G-d, King of the Universe, Creator of the fruit of the vine.

Baruch A-tah Ado-nai E-lo-hei-nu Me-lech Ha-olam borey pree ha-gafen.

Candlelight/Fire (haeesh)

Traditionally, a braided candle with more than one wick is used, but you can use battery-operated candles for safety or simple candles you have on hand.

Psalm 19:9 The precepts of Adonai are right, giving joy to the heart. The mitzvot of Adonai are pure, giving light to the eyes.

Barukh atah Adonai Eloheinu melekh ha'olam, bo're m'orei ha'esh,

Blessed are You O L-rd our G-d King of the Universe who creates the fire's light.

It is customary for the participants to hold their hands up to the candle, and gaze at the reflection of the light in on their palms and nails. We can also think about how we are to be His shining ones in a dark world:

1 Peter 2:9 But you are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, His own special people, that you may proclaim the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light; (TLV)

1 Php 2:14-15 Do everything without kvetching (a little Yiddish for you) or arguing, ¹⁵ so that you may be blameless and pure children of G-d, without defect in the midst of a twisted and perverted generation, a among whom you shine like stars in the sky, (CJV, comment ours)

Spices - (besamim)

The second Havdalah blessing is recited over fragrant spices. The spices can symbolize the sweetness of Shabbat and how we are to be His fragrance in this needy world. The spices commonly used are cloves, cinnamon or bay leaves. They are usually kept in a special decorated holder.

¹⁴ But thanks be to G-d, who in the Messiah constantly leads us in a triumphal procession and through us spreads everywhere the fragrance of what it means to know Him! ¹⁵ For to G-d we are the aroma of the Messiah, both among those being saved and among those being lost...

2 Corinthians 2:14-15 (CJB, emphasis ours)

Blessed are You, L-rd, our G-d, King of the Universe, who creates varieties of spices.

Barukh ata Adonai, Eloheinu Melekh ha-olam, borei minei v'samim.

Separation

But you are a chosen people, the King's cohanim, a holy nation, a people for G-d to possess! Why? In order for you to declare the praises of the One who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light. I Peter 2:9 (C|B)

But you are the ones chosen by G-d, chosen for the high calling of priestly work, chosen to be a holy people, G-d's instruments to do His work and speak out for Him, to tell others of the night-and-day difference he made for you—from nothing to something, from rejected to accepted. I Peter 2:9 (MSG emphasis ours)

Blessed are You, L=RD our G-d, King of the universe, Who distinguishes between the sacred and the secular, between light and dark, between Israel and the

nations, between the seventh day and the six days of labor. Blessed are You, LORD, Who distinguishes between the sacred and the secular.

Barukh ata Adonai Eloheinu, melekh ha'olam, ha'mavdil bein kodesh l'hol, bein or l'hoshekh, bein yisra'el la'amim, bein yom ha'sh'vi'i l'sheshet y'mei ha'ma'a'se. Barukh ata Adonai, ha'mavdil bein kodesh l'hol.

The person who recited the blessings now drinks the juice/wine.

At the conclusion of Havdalah, the flame of the candle is extinguished (or the switch turned off) in the cup of wine, or alternatively, the leftover wine is poured into a small dish and the candle is extinguished in it, as a sign that the candle was lit just for the good deed (or mitzvah) of Havdalah. It is fun to sing *HaMavdil Bein Kodesh LeChol* (*Who Separates Holy from Ordinary/Weekday*). There are a few different versions available on iTunes.

Now we can bless one another with the words Shavua Tov! (Have a good week!).

While this term usually refers to the three main pilgrimage festivals Pessach, Shavuot and Sukkot, we can borrow it for the title of this general overview of the major Appointed Times of the L-rd. The disciples celebrated them. Yeshua celebrated, embodied and, in many ways, fulfilled them or brings them to completion. May each one of these commemoration bring you a deeper joy and understanding in your faith walk with Him. The Hebrew months corresponding to the ones in this planner can be found on www.hebcal.com.

Perception and Perspective

Cautions: We do not recommend or endorse any Kabbalistic practices as mysticism/sorcery is forbidden in Scripture. Also, beware of any congregation that denies Yeshua is the Messiah or makes you feel unworthy to be there unless you follow all the laws to perfection - no one can, which is why we need Yeshua, our High Priest.

We've included pages on the main prayers and blessings for weekly Shabbat and Havdala for now, and hope to add more in next year's planner, and invite you to subscribe to our website updates and highly recommend you continue your learning journey using a good translation of the Bible like the TLV or NKJV and watch the teachings Pastor Greg Stone of Gateway Church's Jewish Ministry, Rabbi Jason Sobel of Fusion Global (he is an advisor for *The Chosen* streaming series about the life of Yeshua and his first talmidim or disciples) who gives a wonderful introduction to the Biblical Holidays on his You Tube channel. For more intermediate to advanced learning, I recommend Beth Am Messiah Congregational online services (also on You Tube) led by Rabbi Aharon Mendez. The books *Walk with Y'shua through the Jewish Year* is great for younger children), *A Family Guide to the Biblical Holidays* by Robin Sampson and *The Complete Guide to Celebrating our Messiah in the Festivals by Susan Mortimer* are both more detailed, comprehensive and helpful for activity-based youth education. Other sites we can recommend include those of Jews for Jesus and First Fruits of Zion. While there are many more resources available than ever before, not all are accurate or reliable, and when in doubt pray for discernment, and ask one of the above teachers for guidance.

It is interesting to note that in each of Adonai's Chosen Dates, we see the symbolism of water. The weekly or monthly mikvah or immersion is an important part of a Jewish person's life as well. Just like when Jesus was immersed by John the "mikvaman", it symbolizes a significant status change. When we *DIVE* into His Chosen Dates and Disciplines, we undergo a definite status change spiritually and won't be the same- we go from an old understanding to new mindset!
